#### Comments

The course felt very split between economic theory and economic modeling. The two rarely related to eachother and made the intent of the class feel all over the place.

The professor was not very charismatic making the interactive lessons less engaging than they could have been.

how the coursework, and tests were weighted

I did not like how sometimes we would learn with worksheets and then sometimes be lectured. It was different depending on the material.

I did not enjoy the textbook readings, I found them a little too long and boring. The in-class lectures helped me understand the concepts much better.

I did not think that the concepts were explained well in the class. I spent the majority of the time lost so think it would be good to teach the material before having a homework on it. I would also like to see more structure in lessons, many lessons felt like we were trying to take on too much material in too short a time so would be better if it was more spread out.
